Early Years Testing begins for Kindergarten and Year 1!

It is once again time for Kindergarten and Year One teachers to complete Early Years Testing with the students. During this time, your child's reading and writing will be assessed. The Literacy and Numeracy assessment tools offer an opportunity for teachers to understand a child's beliefs, attitudes, strengths, thinking process and skills. Teachers will use standardised testing to individually interview students, and learn about how students think, and what they know.

Over the next two weeks (Weeks 6 and 7) time will be dedicated to this testing and your child's teacher will be conducting the assessments. All efforts have been made to provide consistency for the students with the teachers that shall be covering their classes.

Day 1: Bus trip, War Memorial and cabins!

The last activity we did at the War Memorial was attend a Last Post Ceremony. Our school captains were asked to lay a wreath during the ceremony, and we heard the story of a WW2 Veteran. After the Last Post Ceremony, we went to Mt Ainslie lookout for afternoon tea. Soon after we went to our accommodation and had dinner. We were given our cabin rooms and went to sleep.

Day 2: Electoral Education Centre, Museum of Democracy (Old Parliament House), Driving Embassy tour, Questacon, CSIRO Discovery Centre, AIS tour!

Our second day at Canberra was the biggest day of the three! Just after breakfast, we set off for Old Parliament House, where we would learn about voting and the way that our countries' polls and voting systems worked. First, we went to The Electoral Education Centre on the right wing of Old Parliament House, and we learned about the age limits and the questions they would ask the voters. We also got to do a mini voting system ourselves, seeing how someone gets the position after voting, and observing examples on how private and secure the system is in *our Democracy*.

After EEC we went to the other wing of Old Parliament House - The Museum of Australian Democracy. At MoAD, we learned about our Democracy and about the people who changed Australia to make it what it is today. This involved role play and a bit of dressing up. We also got to sit inside The Old Parliament House chambers, and see the significant objects relating to Parliament. Overall, we gained knowledge of how lucky we are to live in a Democracy and how to get our voices heard, no matter the age.

The Embassy Tour was our next event on the list. We saw all the different buildings they used to represent different countries, in our country. Countries such as Poland, Sweden, America, Papua New Guinea, Brazil, Germany, Japan and many more. After the tour, we were all famished and very parched, so we stopped for lunch and had some delicious sausage sandwiches with water and fruit. Being as drained and tired as we were, we had to go on, but had bucket-loads of fun in the meantime!

After we had lunch we went into Questacon. The first thing we did was shop - there were so many cool things inside! After everyone did their shopping, we started to look around in all the different rooms. We all loved looking at all of the science experiments and experiencing the feeling of an earthquake. When we came to the big slide some people did go on it and others chose not to.

After Questacon, we hopped back on the bus ready for CSIRO (Commonwealth Science and Industrial Research Organisation). We played a game where we had to go around finding answers to questions. The "Crisrac" team came out on top in the end, with a massive 22 points! Everyone was amazed! Everyone (who loved sport) was looking forward to our next stop - the AIS (Australian Institute of Sport). It was brilliant and so big. One group went into Sportex while the other got taken around on a tour. Sportex was so fun - all the simulated games, the penalty shoot out, the target hitting game were great!

On the tour, they took us into the swimming pool, showed us the gym and the volleyball courts. We were all tired at this point as we headed back to Canberra Park Resort for some dinner. After a well earned and needed meal we headed back to our cabins for bed. It was a great but hectic day. We were looking forward to Parliament House on day 3.

Year 4 excursion - “Dirt Detectives”

On Friday the first of March 2019 at around 9am, Year 4 and their teachers left Mary Immaculate Primary School to go on an excursion to The Rocks. We have been learning about *First Contacts in Australian history* and wanted to see first hand, where it had happened.

When we arrived at around 10am, we ate and left to do our activities at around 11am. My class had a tour guide named Laura who escorted us to our first activity. Our first activity was digging for replica artefacts in a sand pit. We took off our shoes and gently walked in the sand, we were split into four groups and each group had a certain area to dig. As we started digging, we got to use tools to find lots of artefacts. When we finished digging, we buried the artefacts for the next group to find.

Secondly, our tour guide took us around the site and took us into a place where the Burn family had lived. Margaret Burn and George Burn were married and had seven children. We could see the sandstone foundation of the Burn’s house after it was knocked down.

Thirdly, we listened as our tour guide told us about how George Cribb (he was also a convict), drowned after he was knocked off a boat by a wave. His arm was found in a shark that was caught the next morning!

Finally, we played a game where we sat around a big map on the floor. We placed the convicts names on the map where we thought their houses were. Then we got given an artefact each to study! We drew it, circled the name of the convict we thought it belonged to and wrote why we thought it was theirs.

We arrived back at school exhausted! The trip to The Rocks was fun. I would recommend going there to learn about first contacts because it helped me to understand more about how the convicts had lived.


